



## Former federal prosecutor, cattle rancher Glynn Freeman, 1945- 2012

Glynn Freeman spent decades working as a federal prosecutor and private attorney in Chicago. But after retiring in 2005, she moved to Montana to raise cattle.

Mrs. Freeman, 66, of Livingston, Mont., died of lung cancer, Saturday, Sept. 29, in San Luis Obispo, Calif., said her husband, Lee.

Born in Midland, Texas, Mrs. Freeman graduated from Smith College in Massachusetts. She married in 1968 and moved to Chicago, where she completed law school at Northwestern University in 1971.

After working as a prosecutor with the U.S. attorney's office in Chicago from 1971 to 1977, she joined her husband's law firm, Freeman, Freeman and Salzman, as a partner, specializing in antitrust cases.

"She was a wonderful lawyer in very challenging, high-profile litigation, but she was also incredibly modest," her husband said. "She never tooted her own horn. She was one heck of a lawyer."

Mrs. Freeman was on the board of trustees of the Latin School and the women's board of the Lyric Opera, her husband said.

She retired in 2005 and moved full time to the family's cattle ranch in Livingston.

Mrs. Freeman had always dreamed of running her own ranch, her husband said. "Her first love was cattle ranching," Lee Freeman said.

"She enjoyed all aspects of it — ranch chores, raising the calves, improving the genetics of the herd. It was pretty incredible."

Mrs. Freeman is survived by two sons, Crispin and Clark; a daughter, Cassidy; a foster son, Ryan Allen; her mother, Edna Weger and two brothers, Jim and John Weger.
